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BE GREAT After School Program Grantees Programs & Descriptions 2016-17

KALAMAZOO:

- **Big Brothers Big Sisters of Kalamazoo - High School Bigs \$3,000**

Big Brothers Big Sisters provides children facing adversity with strong and enduring, professionally supported one-on-one relationships that change their lives for the better, forever. With the full support of superintendents and principals in the Parchment, Kalamazoo and Schoolcraft Public School Districts, 90 high school students will be interviewed, trained and intentionally matched with 90 elementary school students based on common interests, needs and expectations. The matches will meet once a week during the school year to provide students with the skills and experiences necessary to improve their academic and social-emotional competence in order to reach their potential. *GJF Funded: 2012 (\$10,000), 2013 (\$7,500), 2014 (\$7,500) and 2015 (\$7,500)*

- **Communities In Schools of Kalamazoo – Literacy Buddies \$4,500**

The mission of Communities in Schools of Kalamazoo is to surround students with support, empowering them to stay in school and achieve in life. The Literacy Buddies program works to improve school success for students with identified risk factors thereby increasing college/career readiness by selecting ten high school “Big Buddies” to each work with 2 elementary “Little Buddies” for 2 days per week. The program will culminate with a celebration of their accomplishments with their families. By offering academic assistance, CIS believes that students can overcome barriers giving hope and confidence for success. *GJF Funded: 2012 (\$10,000), 2013 (\$7,500) and 2015 (\$4,350)*

- **Community Healing Center – STREET Program \$3,500**

S.T.R.E.E.T is an acronym for an approach to helping homeless and at risk youth. It stands for **S**urvival, **T**rust, **R**esources, **E**ducation, **E**mpowerment and **T**hey. The Community Healing Center provides immediate support to survive, helps to build relationships based on mutual respect and trust, gives resources they need to achieve, offers education and opportunities to rebuild self-esteem, and empowers them to move forward; and as a result students become productive and positive role models for their peer group and neighborhood. The goals of the program are to enhance life skills, influence positive behavior and attitude change, support higher academic achievements, reduce violence and decrease underage drinking and drug use. *GJF Funded: 2015 (\$3,500)*

- **Kalamazoo Junior Girls Organization – The “Promise” Pathway to Success \$4,000**

The Kalamazoo Junior Girls Organization recognizes that young girls have unique challenges requiring special attention to help ensure they make successful transitions into adulthood. Their mission is to teach girls and young women to make healthy lifestyle choices while exposing them to social, cultural, educational and civic responsibility opportunities that will help nurture their self-esteem, character and intellectual growth. *GJF Funded - 2012 (\$6,500) and 2015 (\$5,650)*

- **Kalamazoo Symphony Orchestra - Kids In Tune \$6,000**

The mission of the Kalamazoo Symphony Orchestra is to engage the community in compelling musical experiences. KIT is an "orchestra immersion" program that infuses after-school programming with accessible, intensive, and ongoing ensemble-based music learning. Activities include a daily nutritious meal, small group music lessons, orchestra rehearsals, choir, musicianship training, and dance classes. Daily homework help is also provided along with one-on-one tutoring when needed. The kids also give routine "informances" to share their work with the school and community. *GJF Funded: 2012 (\$5,000), 2013 (\$10,000), 2014 (\$7,600), and 2015 (\$7,500)*

MINNEAPOLIS:

- **Agape 24-Hour Child Development Center – School Age Society \$6,000**

The mission of Agape 24-Hour Child Development Center is to promote safe, nurturing and sustainable learning environments for families in transition from instability to self-sufficient and healthy lifestyles not driven by crisis. Their goals are to provide stable and adequate non-standard hour care for children (infants to 12 years) in a safe environment. They meet needs by providing integrated services in child development, family empowerment, advocacy, support and domestic violence intervention programs. *GJF Funded: 2014 (\$2,400)*

- **Hospitality House Youth Development - Urban Learning Center \$8,500**

Hospitality House Youth Development is a faith-based outreach focused on the spiritual, intellectual and physical development of urban youth and their families. The Urban Learning Center serves K-12th grade youth in North Minneapolis. Students from 23 different schools participate as a partner with Minneapolis Public Schools to provide educational assistance. Each student has an Individualized Education Plan designed to improve their academic performance. HHYD's focus is on academic enrichment, cultural, spiritual, and recreational activities that guide learning and engage children and youth in healthy & beneficial activities. *GJF Funded: 2013 (\$5,000), 2014 (\$12,500) and 2015 (\$7,500)*

- **Minds Matter of the Twin Cities, Inc. –Summer Enrichment Program \$7,000**

Minds Matter invests the time and resources in talented, lower-income students to help them successfully navigate the challenges on the path to college. Their emphasis is to prepare 10th, 11th and 12th graders in a three year program by providing individualized attention from mentors and group instruction to focus on test preparation, writing and math skills. As a result students gain confidence, receive academic and social enrichment and strengthen their college applications. The goal of Minds Matter is to radically alter the trajectory of talented students' lives. *GJF Funded: 2014 (\$2,500) and 2015 (\$5,000)*

- **Opportunity Neighborhood – Common Collective Program \$7,500**

Opportunity Neighborhood collaborates to support and strengthen neighborhoods within affordable housing communities through cooperative partnerships. The Common Collective provides a safe and positive outlet for at-risk youth through an afterschool learning centered environment in which students can focus on academic advancement, learn important life skills that include conflict resolution, positive decision making, good citizenship, healthy lifestyles choices, as well as develop relationships with positive role models.
